



Tree Planting in Rochdale Park

Trees help to make our communities beautiful and improve our quality of life.

This summer a reforestation project will be completed by Saskatoon's Urban Forestry division in Rochdale Park.

The City of Saskatoon will be planting twenty five trees throughout Rochdale Park as part of the reforestation project. This project is an initiative to maintain tree canopy in city parks by replacing trees that have been removed over the years.

The tree planting will begin end of June and should be completed in 1-2 days. During this time, large equipment will be on site to plant the trees. Basket trees will be planted and will be watered via truck during the establishment period which may last 2-3 seasons.

This project will include a combination of 25 trees in the park. A large variety of species have been selected by Forestry Technicians to enhance the atmosphere of the park. These species include: American Elm, Prairie Spire Green Ash, Basswood, Baron Manitoba Maple, Nobility White Ash, Cardinal Royale Mountain Ash, Ivory Pillar, Japanese Tree Lilac, Bur Oak, Silver Maple and Prairie Horizon. All of these trees have been selected in accordance to the hardiness zone and are planted with great success throughout various parks in the City of Saskatoon. None of the trees selected are susceptible to the cottony ash psyllid.
